The Colorado Supreme Court declared that Telluride had the constitutional right to condemn land outside its borders and preserve it from development.

THE FILMMAKERS

FOREVER WILD was directed and produced by a team of creative activists dedicated to promoting environmental preservation and utilizing their collective talents to catalyze change.

Bryan Reinhart (Director) is an American producer, director, and editor. Reinhart's first Hollywood experience was producing a documentary on the feature film Hoosiers which led to an opportunity to work with the Coen Brothers on Raising Arizona. As a filmmaker, he finds it just as important to take the time to teach. For 17 years Bryan Reinhart has been a film instructor in Sedona, AZ.

Ron Melmon (Executive Producer) is a businessperson with a finger on the pulse of environmental and democracy issues facing our world today. He started shooting with still film cameras in 1968 and then owned camera stores in the 1970's. Most recently he was awarded a Digital Media Arts Degree from Yavapai College in Sedona, AZ. Ron has been a producer all his life and is extremely proud of **FOREVER WILD**.

Christopher S. Johnson (Editor) is a career documentary film editor who is drawn to stories concerning the environment and human rights. Before joining the team that created **FOREVER WILD**, Christopher edited documentaries for television, including the Emmy Award winning, Sonic Sea and Acid Test for Discovery Channel, Cesar's Last Fast for Netflix, Harmony for NBC and HRH Prince of Wales, and The Sierra Club Chronicles for the Sundance Channel.

Jim Hurst (Cinematographer) Jim Hurst is an Emmy-nominated cinematographer, photographer, sound recordist, adventurer, and filmmaker who has worked on documentary films from the peaks of the Himalayas to Midway Atoll in the center of the Pacific Ocean. He

specializes in self-sufficient location documentary shooting in places where a large crew would be impractical or obtrusive. His camerawork was featured in the Oscar-winning Free Solo for National Geographic.

FILMMAKER STATEMENT

From the Producer, Ron Melmon:

When people ask me how this project came together I remember it was the result of a visit to my niece who lives in Telluride, CO. On a recent trip to visit her, I asked about the gateway to the town – this big beautiful, open green space that the San Miguel River meanders through, greeting locals and visitors everyday. I was curious why the gateway hadn't been developed.

She told me the 600 acres had been slated for homes, condos, golf courses, lakes, and commercial development. The majority of Telluride opposed this and were given a court ultimatum that included a price tag of \$50M and a three month deadline to raise the funds to keep the Valley Floor forever wild.

How did they do it? I was fascinated and intrigued. My niece and I started compiling notes, buying books, scouring newspapers and making lists of those who could help us tell their story. Quickly it became quite daunting!

At that time I was working as a videographer for our own Sedona International Film Festival. One of my tasks was to shoot the Documentary Film Workshop that included a panel of documentarians. The moderator was Bryan Reinhart, a filmmaker and educator I've known for 15 years. One of the answers to a question Bryan asked was very eye opening: A filmmaker from England had been working on her film for almost 15 years! I sure didn't want my project to take that long. Then it hit me. I needed help.

I wondered if Bryan would be interested in assisting me. The rest is history. Suffice it to say, we got together, surrounded ourselves with an award-winning team, and manifested a great film.
